It's hard to believe that July is now past us and we're closer to back-to-school shopping than Fourth of July fireworks. As August begins, it's also hard to believe it's already been three years since August once began so rudely for many of us.

The first day of August 2006 was a Tuesday. I remember heading back to work that day after a four-day weekend. It was not a four-day weekend by choice.

Were you living in Lake Erie Shores when July turned to August in 2006? The night of July 27 of that year was a Thursday, a night that began with some rain. By early Friday morning, the "storm of the century" was in full effect. For a lot of Lake Erie Shores residents, that meant an overflowed stream, a water-filled basement or both.

Our street, Outrigger Cove, was practically a river in the early-morning hours of that Friday. The water was up past the sidewalk, and we could have had boat races in the rushing current. It wasn't, however, as deep as the water ended up being in our basement.

I will never forget the sight of nearly 4 feet of sewer water climbing the basement stairs of our new home. I'll never forget hauling dripping, ruined possessions up those stairs, nor forget the mountains of garbage in so many driveways all weekend, waiting to be hauled away.

There is also one other thing I will never forget about that last weekend of July, 2006: the residents of Lake Erie Shores.

People we didn't know, or barely knew, came to each other's aid. We bailed water together. We lent and borrowed hoses and pumps and towels and buckets. We had help moving things from the basement, and we helped others. We asked together, "How could this happen?"

Down at our end of Outrigger, the storm cancelled a planned neighborhood party. We had an impromptu one anyway, getting burgers from a local restaurant one neighbor managed, and drowning sorrows together after everybody's basements had nearly drowned. It was a weekend of utter disaster and exhausting labor, but it was also the weekend neighborhood bonds were formed. It probably happened on your street, too. By the time August 1 rolled around, we had endured a horrendous storm and formed some enduring friendships.

Every year since then, in our corner of Lake Erie Shores, we've gotten together on the last weekend of July – our little anniversary "flood party." And as July turns to August, we remember how much many of us lost in that flood three years ago.

And what we all gained.

Beach Area News – by Doug Smith

Disappointment over the lack of Lake Erie Shores beach has been a topic of neighborhood conversations and a point of frustration throughout the summer of 2009.

Earlier Spring reports from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers office at the Detroit District, which has accountability, here, with the Buffalo office, certainly implied that the water level of Lake Erie would be about the same as 2008. That would, thereby, also predict similar or even better beaches.

But the Corps of Engineers' predictions were wrong.

According to Keith Kompoltowicz, Meteorologist for Great Lakes Watershed Hydrology in Detroit, water levels are higher than expected. He says:

"Lake Erie is currently above average due to several months of wet weather. Since the start of the year only the month of May has seen lower than average precipitation across the Lake Erie basin. Through the end of June, total precipitation is about 3 inches above average for 2009.

"A large snow pack this winter also provided runoff that fed the lake."

Still, the Corps of Engineers, website is still predicting a decline in lake water levels through August and September by four to five inches. That could give allow for the return of sand within the stone walls surrounding Lake Erie Shores' nowtiny beach area.

One positive sign can be seen in the sand-fill already taking place at the wall, just across from the bottom stairway landing. It does offer residents a safe children's play area, as well as an area of comparison to monitor declining water levels.
